# OBSERVATIONAL DRAWING



- Observational drawing means drawing what you see in real life.
- It's about capturing details like shape, size, light, shadow, and texture.

## Let's see an example!

In the first sketch, the apple drawn is without observation-just a basic outline with no details. While in the second sketch, by carefully observing its shape, size, light, shadow and texture, the apple is drawn with better accuracy and realism.







## It's Time for an Observation Challenge

Find three simple objects around you, eg. a cup, a pen, etc. Without looking at them, draw each one from memory. Now, take a moment to carefully observe their shape, details, and textures. This time, redraw them while focusing on what you truly see! Compare both drawings—can you spot the differences? This is the power of observational drawing!

## IMAGINATIVE DRAWING



- Imaginative drawing comes from your mind, allowing you to create things that don't exist in real
  life, like unique characters, fantasy worlds, or abstract shapes...
- It's about transforming random shapes, lines, or abstract ideas into meaningful objects or scenes
  using creativity and imagination.

## Let's see an example!

In the first sketch, you see a simple cloud shape—just a basic outline. But in the second sketch, using imagination and creativity, the cloud transforms into a cat! This is the essence of imaginative drawing, taking something ordinary and turning it into something completely new with creativity.
